# How to Use The Visualized Bible



Using the Visualized Bible requires minimal teaching skills. Even a new teacher, with study and practice, can use the Visualized Bible, one of the most effective curriculum for teaching Bible doctrine. Notes for the teacher, outlines, Scripture memorization tools and suggested activities make this an interactive series where teachers' and students' lives are dramatically impacted by the truth.

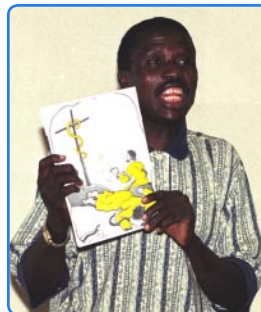
## Teaching varies from lesson to lesson depending on:

- The subject to be taught
- The teaching environment
- The characteristics and needs of the student
- The teacher's personality
- The Holy Spirit's guidance

Familiarize yourself with the following 13 steps. You will feel confident teaching these visualized Bible lessons!

1. Carefully remove the lesson text from the center of the book.
2. Read through the entire lesson at one sitting. This will give you the "big picture," the whole of what the lesson conveys.
3. Read the suggested Scripture passages for the lesson. Ask the Lord, "As a result of this lesson, what do You want my students to know, feel, and do?" Each lesson includes suggested aims, but these may not be applicable for your students. Remain flexible, yet dependent on the Holy Spirit who will guide you as you teach.

4. Study the text while flipping through the visuals. Familiarity with them will help your teaching to flow more smoothly
5. Commit the main points and ideas of the lesson to memory. Make simplified notes to clarify a concept (e.g., forgiveness) in more detail.
6. Look for opportunities where you can lead pupil discussions or use activities during the class session. Convey content without lecturing. Give your students a reason to listen and think by capturing their imagination and challenging them to a deeper commitment to Christ.
7. Tell the story from memory as much as possible. Being very knowledgeable about the lesson helps memory retention, plus it is more interesting for listeners to be "told" a story, and not just "read" to. Many teachers, however, need memory aids so we encourage the use of an outline or "keyword" sheet.
8. Fold an 8½" x 11" sheet of paper in half to become a 5½" x 8½" booklet. Write sequential, important phrases for each point of the lesson. Include Scripture references you want to refer to, questions to ask and activities for the students to do. Some teachers find it helpful to color code their lesson notes with a colored pencil.
9. Place these notes in your Bible at the main Scripture portion from which your lesson is taken. Use a rubber band through the center of the notes and around the spine of your Bible to hold the sheet in place. This enables you to teach while holding your Bible and the Visualized Bible volume.
10. Begin the lesson time with prayer. Then capture the attention of your students with a story, an example, or a question related to the main idea of the lesson.



11. Display the first visual which coordinates with your lesson. Hold the volume so that students can easily view it as you teach. Be sure not to cover the visual with your hand, show two pages at the same time, or forget to change the visuals as you teach.
12. Avoid the temptation to hold up the visual briefly, lay the volume down, and then read aloud the lesson from the printed text. This creates a lifeless presentation and you will lose a valuable opportunity to interact with the students. Let the words of the lesson come from your heart.

13. Conclude the lesson by inviting students to respond in some way. Depending on the direction and thrust of the lesson, this might include moving into a discussion time or giving your students some way to silently or publicly respond to the gospel or spiritual growth challenge.
